# **Smolt tracking project 2016**


In April (2016) fifty salmon smolts from the Upper Deveron rotary screw trap were surgically implanted with acoustic identification tags and tracked through the river and the immediate Moray Firth using Automatic Listening Stations (ALS). The tags emit unique acoustic high frequency pulses that identify the specific fish when detected by an acoustic receiver. Nine ALS receivers were deployed along the length of the River Deveron at the following locations; Edinglassie, Castle Water, Avochie, Mains of Mayen, Br. Marnoch, Montcoffer and two at Banff Bridge (see map). A further 5 receivers were deployed in Banff Bay as a curtain stretching across the bay from Banff Marina towards Macduff Harbour. All the receivers were successfully retrieved at the end of June and the data downloaded. The tagging was conducted by Dr Matt Newton from SCENE at Glasgow University and was written up and submitted as scientific paper by Angus Lothian as part of his MSc at Glasgow University.

## **Summary Results**

Overall survival of smolts in the River Deveron was 40%. with a higher observed mortality in the river (0.77% per km) (Figure 1) than in the marine stage of migration (0% per km), resulting in a significantly higher survival rate in the marine stage than the river. There was no observed effect of a tag influencing whether a smolt left the river or not and the smallest fish tagged was detected on the marine array.

A greater swim speed was observed in the marine environment than in the river. The main smolt trajectory leaving the river was north-easterly (Figure 2). Mortality in the river is most likely due to predation, although the exact cause cannot be determined. The absence of mortality in Figure 1 river mouth morphology. 

### Wild salmon conservation measures


The Deveron has been classified as a Category 1 salmon river by Scottish Government, which indicates that 'exploitation is sustainable therefore no additional management action is currently required. This recognises the effectiveness of existing non-statutory local management interventions.' The Water of Philorth has been classified as a Category 3 river, which requires all salmon to be returned by law throughout the 2017 season (Scottish Government 2016).

### **Comings and goings...**

### 2016 catches

The provisional rod-catch returns for salmon show a 59% increase from 2015, with Angler's landing a total of 1563 salmon and grilse. 100 salmon were caught during the spring (Feb-May). 444 sea trout were landed and 14 beats recorded 533 brown trout. 80% of salmon (85% of spring salmon), 94% of brown trout and 96% of sea trout were returned to the river. The fixed engine (nets) stations did not operate during 2016. The Water of Philorth, which enters the sea near Fraserburgh, recorded 14 sea trout and 2 grilse.

#### **Claim Procedure**

- **1.** Take a scale sample (6-10 scales from behind and below dorsal fin) from salmon, place in scale packet/dry envelope and record details of fish to allow fish to be verified.
- 2. Take photo of fish (If possible)
- 3. Return salmon to river unharmed.

# **River Deveron Conservation Code** for salmon and trout 2017

Your Board remains extremely concerned over fragile levels of fish stocks in the river and in particular spring salmon and sea trout. Anglers are asked, therefore, to observe the following guidelines during the forthcoming season:

#### Salmon & Grilse

 From 11th February to 31st May (Inclusive) all salmon to be returned.

It is illegal to take any salmon (dead or alive) from 11th February to 31st March (inclusive) each year.

In conjunction with Chivas Brothers, The Deveron Bogie & Isla Rivers Charitable Trust will donate one bottle of Chivas Regal 12 Year Old Scotch Whisky (70d) per angler, for safely returning a spring salmon between the 1st April and 31st May (follow set claim procedure and Call 01466 711388 to claim) (strictly over 18s only)

 From 1st June to 31st October (Inclusive), anglers may retain one salmon or grilse per rod per day with a maximum of two fish per rod per week

Anglers are asked to observe the Board's aspiration that all hen fish, and any cock salmon over 10lbs be returned. Therefore, the Board requests that only male fish under 10lbs be retained.

#### **Sea Trout**

All sea trout to be returned throughout the season.
The guidance on sea trout will be in place until stocks recover to acceptable levels.

#### **Brown Trout**

- From 15th March to 6th October (Inclusive), all Brown Trout under 10 inches in length to be returned. No more than two brown trout per rod per week to be retained
- It is illegal to fish without legal right or written permission from the beat owner or representative
- It is illegal to kill unclean or unseasonable fish (baggots, gravid fish, kelts)
- It is illegal to sell or buy wild salmon roe
- It is illegal to attempt to deliberately foul hook fish
- Only knotless landing nets to be used it is illegal to use gaffs or tailers
- It is illegal to fish with prawns, shrimps or salmon roe throughout the catchment and throughout the year
- Fishing for salmon and/or sea trout on a Sunday is prohibited
- Spinning lures should have only one single set of hooks with a maximum sized four crimped or barbless
- Anglers are reminded that it is illegal to sell rod-caught salmon or sea trout
- Injured or damaged fish out with the above limits should be handed to the proprietor
- All farmed fish must be retained and notified to the RDevDSFBB.

All visiting anglers must read, act upon and sign a Gyrodactylus salaris declaration form immediately prior to going fishing. If disinfectant is required please contact RDevDSFB Office (01466 711388) or your beat Ghillie/Manager/Agent.
